SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

In Genesis 3, we hear that "when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was the delight to the eyes and that the fruit was to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit and ate" (so did the man). If we look closely at this passage, we can see that three things tempted the woman to disobedience: the fruit was "good for food," it was a "delight to the eyes," and it was "to be desired to make one wise." Those same temptations are later spelled out in 1John2:15-17, the scriptural passage where the Church finds the teaching on concupiscence:

> Do not love the world or the things of the world. If anyone loves the world, love for the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life is not of the Father but is of the world. And the world passes away, and the lust of it; but he who does the will of God abides forever.

The lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life: pleasure, possessions, pride, food, alcohol, drugs, fornication, adultery, pornography, money, clothes, cars, jewelry, gadgets, fame, applause, ignorance, our way, our will, our anger and the thirst for revenge---those are the temptations that pull us away from God. There is no pursuing them both. In the end, you either love God or you love the world, seeing it, not heaven, as your true home. Recognizing that as the choice before us---between loving God or loving the world---should change the way we think of sin. It should help us to grasp that sin is so much more than broken laws. It's broken lives. It's broken hearts. It's broken homes. And it is all that because the laws of God are not arbitrarily imposed. God our Creator knows us better that we know ourselves. And God as our Father loves us better than we love ourselves. He only legislates what he knows will perfect us and fulfill us. His laws are for our good, not his. That is to say, when we sin, we don't really break his laws. We break ourselves against his laws.

We all understand how God's laws work in the physical world. We know that if Congress got together tomorrow and unanimously passed a law repealing gravity, then jumped off a roof, our fine legislators would not fly. They would not break the law of gravity. Rather the law of gravity would break their bones. Well, just as the laws of God are firmly fixed in the physical world, they are firmly fixed in the spiritual world. Moral laws are no more subject to negotiation than physical laws. When we lie, steal, commit adultery or fornicate, we don't only disobey our Father. We disobey our Father by doing the very things he told us would hurt us. The negative things that follow aren't how God punishes us. They are us experiencing the consequences of our failure to trust God. They are us experiencing what happens when we choose not to do what is good for us.

Matthew's Gospel brings home that choice. Jesus goes out into the wilderness and fasts for 40 days. He faces the same three temptations we face---the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life. The devil urges him to turn stones into bread (the lust of the flesh), to prove his divinity by throwing himself down for the angels to catch (the pride of life), and the kingdoms of the world (the lust of the eyes). But Jesus didn't succumb to those temptations. He passed the test that Adam failed. This failure of Satan points out sin in our lives. It is more than distrusting God who call us to more than Eden. It is the refusal of sonship. It is the refusal of that for which we were made---a life and a love so much greater than this world. It is a refusal of life and love forever in heaven with God.

LENTEN FASTING REGULATIONS

† FASTING is observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by everyone 18 years of age and older, who has not yet celebrated their
59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals enough to maintain strength may be taken, according to each one's needs. But together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but consuming liquids, including milk and juice, is allowed.

[†] ABSTINENCE is observed on Ash Wednesday and ALL Fridays of Lent by everyone 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when one's health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. If a person is unable to observe the above regulations due to health or other serious reasons, other suitable forms of self-denial are encouraged. The point of fasting and abstinence is to remind us of our radical need for God's support as we undergo conversion in his love.
