

HOW MUCH DOES PENTECOST?

From: The Fourth Cup: Unveiling the Mystery of The Last Supper and the Cross, by Scott Hahn

Pentecost is a supremely important feast, which I think is sorely neglected in our day. It is, in any event, profoundly related to the theme of Passover and the fourth cup.

Of all the feasts on the old Jewish calendar, only two have endured as Christian feasts: Passover and Pentecost. These two, with Sukkot, the "Feast of Booths," were the three pilgrimage festivals of ancient Judaism. The Book of Exodus (23:14-17) required all Israelite males to celebrate these three feasts in the holy city, Jerusalem.

Passover and Pentecost were inextricably bound to one another. Pentecost, in fact, gets its very name from its relation to Passover. Pentecost comes from the Greek word for "fiftieth"; Pentecost is the fiftieth day after Passover.

Jews in the first century commemorated the Exodus on Passover. On Pentecost they celebrated God's gift of the Law at Mount Sinai. The first event was ordered to the second. The Israelites were set free not so that they could wander aimlessly but so that they could walk in God's ways—the ways set out for them in the Ten Commandments. In the Old Covenant, Passover happened for the sake of Pentecost. Passover was arguably the more solemn commemoration—the highest point on the calendar—but it required the later feast for its completion.

We find the same dynamic at work in the New Covenant. Jesus' Passover points forward to fulfillment with the gift of the Spirit in the Christian Pentecost. In the fourth Gospel we see Jesus repeatedly making this point, and he does so at the Last Supper, his Passover meal! He tells his disciples that the Counselor, sent by the Father, would bring the work of Jesus to completion (John 14:16,26;15:15; 16:7).

Saints and scholars down through the centuries have been quick to notice another, more subtle correspondence.

When Jesus takes the Paschal fourth cup, he is suffering on the cross. It is given to him from a sponge attached to a hyssop branch (the same type of branch Moses commanded to be used for sprinkling the blood of the covenant; see Exodus 12:22). Saint John, an eyewitness, chose his words carefully as he described what happened in that moment—and God inspired him in every word he chose

"When Jesus had received the vinegar," John tells us, "he said, 'It is finished'; and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit" (John 19:30).

I cannot help, here, but recall the question: What is finished?

The Passover is finished. The Passover has been fulfilled. It began the evening before as the Passover of the Old Covenant, but it now finds fulfillment on the cross on Good Friday—as the Passover of the New Covenant.

Jesus has taken the fourth cup. Everything has been fulfilled. And, in that fulfillment, he "gave up his spirit," thus foreshadowing the gift that would come to the Church on Pentecost. It is worth noting that he also, according to John's account, "from that hour" (19:27) gave up his mother and his sacramental blood and water (19:34), all as gifts to the Church of his beloved disciples.

The sacrifice was done, once for all. The Passover had been transformed. Now all that remained was its application to the Church forever.
