SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

The very day that Jesus first rose from death, he appeared to his apostles, telling them, "Peace be with you." They rejoice but he says to them again, "Peace be with you." Twice he says it. Jesus desires them not to be afraid. St. Paul writes, "I appeal to you by the mercy of God..." in his letter to the Romans. He writes this speaking of God who desires us to love him rather than to fear him. He is our Lord, yes, but more than that he desires us to see him as our Father. Love him as our loving Father. This he desires and asks us in his great mercy so that he can avoid having to punish us in his severity for we have all sinned. Every one of us.

Listen to our Lord's appeal. He became a man, a human being just like us. In him, he wants us to see our own body, our heart, our bones, our blood. We may very well fear what is divine but let us love what is human. We may seek to run away from him as the Lord, but why not run to him as our Father? Perhaps we are filled with shame for having a share in causing his passion on the cross. Do not be afraid. The cross inflicts a mortal injury not on Jesus but on death. The nails no longer pain him. Jesus appeared to the apostles with his wounds but with no pain. The nails no longer hurt him but only deepen his love for us. Jesus cried out not because of the wounds, but that through them he could draw us into his heart. His body was stretched out on the cross as a symbol not of how much he suffered but of his all-embracing love. He counts it not a loss to shed his blood. It is the price he paid for our ransom. Come, then, return to God and learn to know him as your Father. Know that he repays good for evil, that he gives love for injury and boundless charity for piercing wounds. This is God, our loving Father!

St. Paul says, "I appeal to you by the mercy of God to present your bodies as a living sacrifice." This sacrifice follows the pattern of Christ's sacrifice by which he gave his body as a living sacrifice for the life of the world. He really made his body a living sacrifice because though slain, he continues to live. In such a victim death receives its ransom, but the victim remains alive. Death itself receives the punishment. This is why death for the martyrs is actually a birth. Their end is a new beginning. Their execution is the door to life. Those who were thought to have been erased for the earth shine brilliantly in heaven.

"Sacrifice and offering you did not desire, but you have prepared a body for me," Isaiah says. Each of us is called to be both a sacrifice to God and to be his priest. Do not forfeit what divine authority gives to you. Put on the garment of holiness and gird yourself with the belt of chastity. Let Christ be your helmet and let the cross on your body be your protection. Take up the sword of the Holy Spirit. Let your heart be an altar. Then with full confidence in God present your body as a sacrifice. For God desires not death but faith. He thirsts not for blood but for self-surrender. God is pleased not by slaughter but by the offering of your free will.

He is pleased by your offering of Jesus Christ. "Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world." He is pleased by your offering. He is pleased as you run to him as a loving Father. As a Father who offers and gives to you eternal life with him.
