The Epiphany of the Lord January 7, 2024

Merry Christmas!!! Yes, it is still Christmas although tomorrow, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is the last day of this most special season. Tuesday will be our first day in ordinary time. As we celebrate this feast of Epiphany, we remember it is sometimes referred to as "Little Christmas" recognizing it as the second greatest feast of all the different days we celebrate as part of the Christmas season. When I was a child, we always called it the Feast of the Three Kings because that is what we remembered...the three kings (we now call them Magi or just wise men) coming from far away in the East in search of the newborn king. Many of our church fathers saw the significance in the wise men bringing gold, frankincense, and myrrh as gifts for the new king. Does anyone remember what the meaning of the gifts were?

We read in the gospel of Matthew, "Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, Wise Men from the East came to Jerusalem, saying, 'Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the East and have come to worship him." The early Christians saw the similarities between this event and the one in the Old Testament book of First Kings. "When the queen of Sheba heard about the fame of Solomon concerning the name of the Lord, she came to test him with hard questions. She came to Jerusalem with a very large retinue, with camels carrying spices and very much gold and precious stones; and when she came to Solomon, she told him all that was on her mind. King Solomon explained everything she asked about and his wisdom greatly impressed her. She had not believed the reports about him and came to see for herself. She told Solomon, "Your wisdom and prosperity surpass the reports which I heard!" and she gave him gifts of gold, spice and precious stones. In looking at the two stories, Christians remembered the words of Isaiah, the prophet, "Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your rising...the wealth of the nations shall come to you...they shall bring gold and frankincense, and shall proclaim the praise of the Lord."

The Gospel demonstrates that what the Israelites experienced under King Cyrus in their return and rebuilding of Israel was but a foretaste of the riches God would bestow on the people at the coming of his Messiah. At Christmas, the kings bring the treasures back to Jerusalem. It signals the beginning of the restoration of the nation and the rejoicing of God's people at the coming of the Savior. To this very day wise men and women still seek him. But what gift shall we bring? What does one give to Jesus, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords? Let us follow the example of the Magi. More than gold, frankincense and myrrh, they gave gifts of worship, time and hope. When others saw the darkness of night, they saw the light. They were so filled with hope at the light of the star, they packed up and set off on the long journey, seeking Jesus, the new born king. They gave of their time. Scholars speculate their journey took two years or more before they finally found Jesus. As they devoted themselves to seeking Jesus, so should we. Herod, the scribes, and the people of Jerusalem didn't leave the city and go a few miles up the road when they heard of the king. Instead, they were unhappy and wondering what changes they would be forced to endure. Let us not be like them. Finally, the Magi gave their worship. These were men of wealth. How else could they afford to go on a long journey with gifts for the new king? They were men of influence. How else could they have showed up unannounced and received an appointment with Herod? They were men of intellect. How else could they have travelled hundreds, maybe thousands of miles of terrain following a star? Men of wealth, influence and intelligence.

What did they do when they found Jesus?

Matthew tells us, "They fell on their knees and worshiped!"

Let us do the same!!! Come, let us worship the King!
